May is Pet Cancer Awareness Month

Did you know that cancer is the #1 disease-related cause of death in our cats and dogs? The fact is that few pet guardians are aware of this.

Causes of Cancer

Genetics

Due to improper and over breeding some animals are just more prone to cancer. Always avoid animals that have been "mass" bred in puppy and kitten mills.

Over-Vaccination

Over-Vaccination has been clinically proven to weaken the body's immune system. This does not mean you should not vaccinate your pet. You definitely want to make sure your pet is protected

from those diseases prevalent to your geographical area. This is something you should sit down and discuss with your vet.

Environmental Toxins

Exposure to chemicals in the environment (even in carpet) can cause cancer. You can do a "Toxic Screening" of your household and environment.

Improper, Chemicalized Foods

Research has confirmed that daily doses of chemical additives and preservatives can build up in the body and can be carcinogenic.

It is important that you know the early warning signs:

- *Abnormal swelling that persists
- *Sores that do not heal
- *Loss of weight
- *Loss of appetite
- *Bleeding or discharge from any body opening
- *Offensive odor
- *Difficulty eating or swallowing
- *Hesitation to exercise or loss of stamina
- *Persistent lameness or stiffness
- *Difficulty breathing, urinating or defecating

One Brave Kitty's Battle

O'Malley's Story

We adopted our little guy, O'Malley, when he was seven or eight years old. We had him as part of our family for eight years. First he was sneezing a lot. Yet it only seemed to be out of one side of his nose. We brought him to our vet and they gave him antibiotics and allergy meds. There didn't seem to be any improvement. He went in for his second visit; another round of antibiotics. There was no improvement. Next step was to have a surgery to check his nasal cavity. The news came back bad; there was no blockage or reason. This made cancer the most likely diagnosis.



We received a referral the next day to NC State Veterinary School. We had our oncology consult. It came back positive. He had cancer. Scary word, cancer. Dr. Hume was our oncologist and helped us navigate an overwhelming array of choices. O'Malley was diagnosed with aggressive cancer. They completed biopsies to determine the type, lymphoma. The outlook for his type of cancer was six months to a year if treatment went well.

He started having a problem breathing so he went in for radiation on his nasal passage. This brought amazing results. His breathing improved and so did his energy level. He started chemotherapy; once a week he went in for chemo. We had an amazing and healthy three weeks. Then his second round of radiation. This was his last round of radiation because of the location too close to his brain. This was crushing because the results were so effective. We were dependent on the chemo being successful to put him into remission.

He continued to get chemotherapy. Each combination was successful for a few weeks. He switched to different treatments. O'Malley would sleep a lot and hide in the closet when his treatments stopped working. Dr. Hume would reevaluate how he was responding and find a new option when we needed it. At the end of August she let us know we only had three protocols left to try. This was not good news. He responded well to the next protocol. We were back on an amazing high; it looked good again. It worked well for over a month. Did we finally beat it?

He was healthy through the middle of September. He didn't run and play the way he did before he got sick but he was happy and spent time with us. Then in October he took a turn for the worse. The two last protocols were long shots. They were unsuccessful. At the beginning I asked Dr. Hume to let us know when it was time to stop trying. We rushed him in one night because he lost control of his bowels and was lethargic. We left him overnight and in the morning Dr. Hume called to say they could not get him hydrated. Our little guy had fought a brave battle but she verbalized what I did not want to acknowledge, the battle was over and it was time to put him to sleep.

The entire oncology department was incredible. They gave him the best medical care in a compassionate and loving manner. He went in for his treatments and still liked the staff there. His two special people were Dr. Hume and Francesca. They were as kind with the final moments as they were throughout his treatment. It made it a little better to have people who cared for him there to help walk us through these decisions.

I missed my little guy terribly. There was no one to run and meet me when I came home from work or curl up with me when I took a nap. I was grieving for my kitty friend. Cat Angels was looking for volunteers. I started volunteering every Sunday. Here was a group of cats that appreciated being petted and around people. I went in every Sunday and the kitties helped heal my grieving heart. The longer I was there the more I got out of my time at the shelter. The more I was at the agency the deeper my respect became for the group running this agency. Out of this awful event, I met amazing people.

The more time I spent at the agency the more I missed have a little guy at home. A couple of the cats wormed their way into my heart. I brought my husband in to meet my favorites. He always swore he didn't want a kitten. Then he met Shelly. He fell in love with our little girl. We brought her home and were filled with joy. She followed us around the house and talked to us. Our little girl brought joy to our home. After a month, as I was still volunteering at the shelter, another kitten wormed her way into my heart. We wanted to bring a second cat home for Shelly to have a friend. We decided to bring Pixie home.

She came home on a Sunday after I volunteered at the shelter. The two little ladies were just like sisters. They were interested in each other but keeping a distance. They have been living in our home for a month now. They play and cuddle. There is so much love and laughter in our home again.

Cancer had a devastating impact on our life. It took someone we love desperately from us. It felt unfair and terrible. The redeeming moments in this experience were in the connections we made with people. The NC State Veterinary Oncology Department and Cat Angels helped us through the terrible period. I will continue to volunteer at Cat Angels as they have made my life richer and fuller.

A Day In The Life of a Cat Angels Volunteer

A normal day volunteering at the Cat Angels facility consists of the following tasks: Fluffing and/or replacing towels and blankets in the cat rooms, Scoop litter boxes (we use Feline Pine litter so there is no dust to inhale), Provide fresh food and water, Vacuum the cat rooms, give meds if needed, and oh yeah, love on the cats.

Many of the cats enjoy helping while you clean their rooms. They find scooping extremely interesting and love to help!

Our Quarantine section requires extra care. This is where cats are temporarily housed when they first enter into our program. They receive a clean bill of health before being matched to the proper room. Some of them need medication or require special care before being moved to a room.

The More the Merrier?

Statistics show that most people with cats usually have more than one. If you fall into this category, you'll know how important it is to create and maintain harmony among your feline friends. There's nothing worse than having to manage cats that can't get along, and being constantly on the alert for hissing matches that can flare into fights.

Whether you want to prevent this from happening to you - or if it has and you need some guidance - the following keys will help you unlock your cats' potential to get along.

1. Know where your cats came from

How a cat will adapt to a newcomer depends on the ages, personalities and prior experiences of both animals, so it's a good idea to find out as much as you can about any cat you are adopting. Where did she come from and what is her background? How old is she, and how does she react to the other cats in the shelter or rescue? Does she seem outgoing and friendly, or fearful and defensive?

2. Recognize that most cats are socially awkward

Misunderstandings are common in cats. A cat may chase or swat at another in play, but the other cat might take it as an intentional threat, which means the play can quickly escalate into aggression.

With this in mind, you can see the importance of supervising, monitoring, and even limiting interactions between cats to give them time to become familiar with and trust each other.

3. Micro-manage Introductions

First impressions are very important to cats. Initial introductions that are stressful and unpleasant, and cause the cats to become fearful and aggressive, may cause long term conflicts. Introductions must be micromanaged so both cats are relaxed and friendly rather than threatening or aggressive.

Do not let a new cat loose in your home to work out his relationship with the resident cat on his own. This is truly a recipe for disaster.

Follow these steps:

~Put your new cat in a room separate from your resident cat so they can't see each other except when you are working with them.

~Place blankets or towels with the scent of each cat under the food dish or in the bed of the other, so the odors become familiar.

~Allow your new cat some free time to wander about the house while you confine the existing cat.

~Set up brief, positive encounters between the cats. Do this by giving them tasty treats or gentle massage when they're in each other's presence.

~Go slowly. End the encounters before either cat becomes uncomfortable, fearful or aggressive. Gradually allow the cats more freedom together, and relax your supervision as the encounters continue to go well.

4. Arrange your home to minimize conflicts

Your cats may prefer to keep their distance from one another, especially in the early stages of their relationship. Support this by setting up multiple "resource stations" throughout the house. Food, water bowls, litter boxes, beds, toys and other necessities should be positioned in several locations that can't be easily guarded, so your cats can comfortably get what they need while having a good chance of avoiding one another.

What does Cat Angels have in common with this famous author?



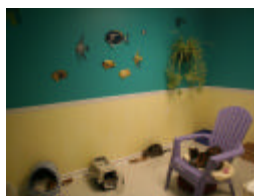

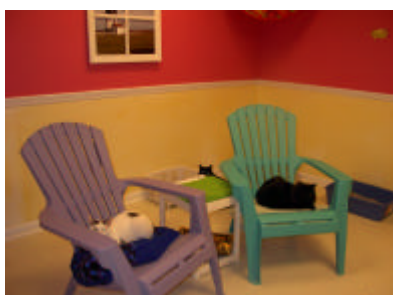
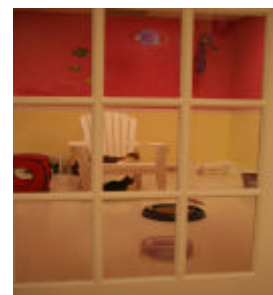


You’ll even see a picture of this famous cat lover hanging in our facility.

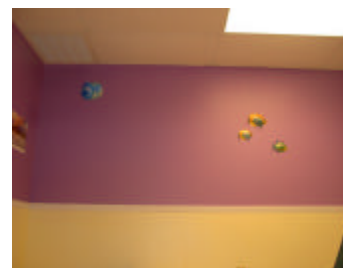
Schools of colorful fish adorn the walls of each room to give the cats visual stimulation (but, we like them, too)

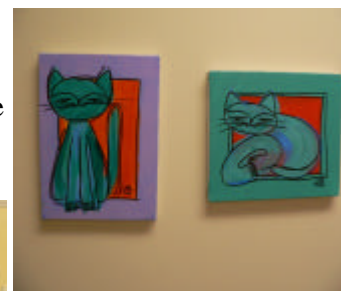


Cat Angels has four each painted in a bright regularly make a mess of more sedate adult cats

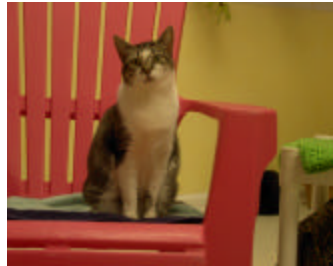
